This month we are pleased to introduce you to a pair of relatively new members, Zipangani and Roseby Vokhiwa, who joined FFGA just last April at the urging of their longtime friend President Cynthia Williams. Since that time Zipangani and Cynthia have already begun discussions with Friendship Force International to set up a Discovery Exchange to Malawi in the summer of 2014, if possible, to assist in the establishment of a Friendship Force club there.

Zipangani (Zipa) and Roseby (Rose) Vokhiwa were born in Malawi and moved to the USA in 1984 and 1985, respectively.

Zipangani came to study at California State Polytechnic in Pomona from March 1984 to June 1985, when he moved to Colorado State University, where he completed his bachelors, masters and doctoral degrees in animal sciences and range ecology. He is a retired Malawi government civil servant. Before joining Mercer University in 2007, he taught at Kennesaw State University from 2003 to 2007. As an associate professor at Mercer University, Zipangani has led three "Mercer on Missions" projects to Malawi, where Mercer students worked in orphanages, community gardens and clinics assisting Malawians. On a Fulbright Grant-sponsored project this past June, Zipa led a group of ten teachers and two administrators from K-12 schools in the metro Atlanta area on a four-week field research expedition to Malawi.

Rose joined her husband in January 1985 together with their five-year-old daughter and three-year-old son. She completed her associate nursing degree at Larimer County Community College in Cheyenne, Wyoming. Currently, Rose is a registered nurse at Northside Hospital in Cherokee County.

Zipangani and Rose have resided in Acworth since June of 1999. Their daughter Mphatso Abigail and her husband live in Marietta, their son, Kondwani Jolly, lives in Smyrna, and their last-born daughter, Adziwa Chyembekezo, lives and works in Washington, D.C.. Zipa and Rose both still have family members in Malawi. Rose has one brother and two sisters there. Zipa has one brother and two sisters in Malawi and one sister in Zimbabwe.

FFGA Visits the Monastery of the Holy Spirit near Convers. On a beautiful, clear fall day 26 members of our club enjoyed a tour of the grounds and facilities which are home to approximately 40 Trappist Monks residing at the monastery. Everyone enjoyed a fellowship that such a peaceful setting provided. In addition to producing fine baked goods, stained glass, and culturing Bonsai Plants for sale, the Monks also conduct restorative retreats where one can stay and withdraw from the daily tribulations of life in the modern world.

The morning would bring a wide variety of things to do during a free day of shopping and sightseeing, before all assembled at ED Ken McKinney's condo near Piedmont Park for the official Welcome Party. delicious Low Country Broil was served by FFGA volunteer hostess Sue Mills. Gift bags containing various useful items and a few humorous Halloween adornments were distributed by each Host to their Ambassador. The evening progressed with song, wine and laughter. Particularly moving was a Ukrainian lullaby sung by Mike Sakmar in the native tongue of his Ukrainian Mother, recently deceased. The party ended after a brief tour of the ED's apartment, as the next morning would bring an early start to a full and busy day in downtown Atlanta.

Everyone traveled north to the city of Cartersville where they were treated to a guided tour of the Booth Western Museum of Art. Besides getting a thorough understanding of America's Western history, the guests also got to enjoy real Southern Barbecue, a craft fair of western goods, authentic American Indian dancers and a reenactment of the gunfight at the OK Corral. On the same evening, Hosts and Ambassadors were welcomed into the homes of other members of FFGA who had volunteered to host a dinner party for them, which was greatly appreciated by all. Sunday morning was free time to attend church services, if so desired, or to do a bit of shopping before visiting the Atlanta Botanical Gardens at 2:00 PM. This was during the final weekend of the gardens' "Imaginary Worlds" exhibit and they were overflowing with people. All of this was handled with great aplomb by our volunteer guide, FFGA member and Botanical Garden docent, Wanda Bokoski. Many thanks are due for her excellent knowledge of both the exhibit and of the various plants throughout the garden. Both the hosts and the Ambassadors were amazed at the fifteen foot tall cobras, the huge Ogre and the Earth Goddess displays, all created with multi-colored plant life. They also appreciated the beauty of the orchids in the Fuqua Conservatory.

The final day of the exchange was spent at the Martin Luther King Historical Site, where the ambassadors learned of the struggle for civil rights endured by the African-American segment of our population. After a tour of the Kings' home, and the Memorial reflecting pool surrounding Rev. King's eternal resting place, the Ambassadors paused for a late lunch before returning to their hosts' homes to prepare for the evening Farewell (Halloween) Party.

Although Halloween is not celebrated in the Ukraine as it is in America, the Ukrainians did a quick study and decided to immerse themselves in the spirit of the season to the max. They immediately started to acquire the appropriate costumes and accessories needed to become everything from princesses to ghouls. The party was at the Wilhelm residence, which was decorated in a suitable manner for the occasion to include numerous small pumpkins and a robotic door ghost to greet the menagerie of creatures who would soon pass through their front portal. Even the hosts were in the right frame of mind for the celebration and wore slightly more sedate, age appropriate finery for the party. All enjoyed an excellent farewell dinner served up buffet style by the Supreme Hostess Glenda Wilhelm. The Ambassadors seem to have a great time posing and taking any number of photographs for the folks back home. Rest assured that if anyone had suggested that the Ukrainians go trick-ortreating they would have been out on the streets in an NYC minute, regardless if the correct date for that was still three days away.

Sadly all good things must come to an end, and so it was with this exchange. The Ambassadors were scheduled to fly on to Orlando on Tuesday morning, although some rented automobiles to drive instead of fly. They would next visit the Mouse and his friends as tourists before heading to Miami and the trip home.

The exchange will be taking place in Fort Myers, Florida for the first week with the second week in Atlanta. Harvey Brickley.was the outbound ED in 2011 and has volunteered to be the E.D. for this inbound exchange. He is eager to begin the necessary planning and is already coordinating with both of his counterpart E.D.s to

confirm how many hosts he will need for our exchange. Most of the "Ticos", as Costa Ricans like to refer to themselves, speak excellent English, so communication should not be a problem for our hosts. Portia A. Scott 6/6/1943 – 10/2/2013

For those who did not receive the earlier e-mail report, I have the sad duty to inform you of yet another club member who has passed on. Ms Portia A. Scott suffered cardiac arrest at her home following a brief bout with ovarian cancer. Her funeral service at the Warren Memorial Methodist Church on the 9^{th} of October was well attended by many of Atlanta's celebrities and friends.

Ms Scott had a long and distinguished career at her family's newspaper, The *Atlanta Daily World*, and retired as managing editor of this leading African-American newspaper. With a university degree in journalism from Howard University and a master's degree from American University, in Washington D.C., she was well suited to work in the newspaper trade, doing so for over 40 years.

She was an active member in local and national Republican Party politics, including serving on a Presidential Task Force and on Committees under both President Ronald Reagan and President George H.W. Bush. Ms Scott also was active in a variety of civic and community organizations. She was a member of

Delta Sigma Theta Sorority and the Atlanta Chapter of The Links Inc., as well as several other civic organizations dedicated to improving the city and the community.

One of those organizations is the Southwest Atlanta Branch of the Friendship Force of Greater Atlanta, of which she was the founder, President Emeritus and a representative to the FFGA Board of Directors. Ms Scott worked tirelessly to recruit new members for the Southwest Branch to insure that it was able to continue as a part of the larger organization. Her input regarding club exchanges and operating procedures will be sorely missed, as will her charming smile at the clubs social functions.

She is survived by her daughter, Maryam Jordan, and son-in-law, Demetrius Jordan, as well as three grandchildren, two nephews, a niece and a brother-in-law. Maryam is a Program Services Coordinator for Asia at Friendship Force International.

FROM 1-285


Take I-285 to Exit 18, Paces Ferry Road. Turn East (toward the inside of the perimeter). Cross over Cumberland Parkway and turn left at the second traffic light onto Overlook Parkway. If you cross over railroad tracks you have gone too far. The third drive on the right will be Overlook III and The Vinings Club at 2859 Paces Ferry road. Complimentary parking is available in the parking deck. (Red Route)

FROM I-75 DOWNTOWN

Take I-75 North to Exit 258, Cumberland Boulevard. Turn left off the exit and proceed to the fourth traffic light. Turn left at this corner onto Cobb Parkway (U.S. Highway 41). At the next light turn right onto Paces Mill Road (Look for the BP Gas Station on the corner and a Kroger store on the right). Continue straight on and turn right, after you cross over the railroad tracks, onto Overlook Parkway. The third drive on the right will be Overlook III and The Vinings Club at 2859 Paces Ferry road. Complimentary parking is available in the parking deck. (Blue Route) **OR** Take I-75 North to I-285 West. Follow the directions From I-285, above. (Red Route)

ONCE INSIDE THE OVERLOOK III BUILDING

From the double revolving doors in the main lobby, walk straight back toward the Atrium glass windows. Pass by the main elevators and take the private elevators on the left, labeled Vinings Club and Level 3. Take the elevator down to Level 2 - "The Vinings Club".
